She would not hesitate to cater to members' needs and would go above and beyond the call of duty. She was not always all business though, and often helped plan many social activities for officers.

Mrs. Augustin taught for over 40 years at several schools including the Gordon Walcott Memorial

School, the Ave Maria Girls' Infant and Primary Schools and the Lady Gordon Opportunity Centre. She retired in 2004. She was as equally committed to her students as she was to her duties at the SLTCC.

In her continuous commitment to others, she served as a Eucharistic Minister at the Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Marchand, a member of the Disaster Preparedness Committee and St. John's Ambulance Brigade. She also participated in La Rose groups and Les Danceurs Traditionelle de St. Lucie. In 2005 she was awarded the prestigious Les Pitons Award (SLPM) by the Government and people of St. Lucia and was recognized by the Sacred Heart Catholic Church of Marchand as Mother of the Year in 2009.

Mrs. Jane Augustin sadly passed away on 1st February, 2021. Her memory and legacy lives on. She continues to be a beacon of light and an inspiration to those who knew her.
